XXXIII FOUNDERS DAY

YPS celebrated its 34th Founders' Day on April 9, 2013, with great enthusiasm. The celebrations started with the Academic Procession led by the Principal, Mr R P Devgan. The occasion was made solemn by the school choir rendering a soul-stirring 'shabad'.

The procession was followed by the presentation of reports by the Student Council on the past year's developments in the school. The Junior School Head Boy, Chetan, and the Head Girl, Bismanjeet, presented the Junior School report. They were followed by the Head Boy, Navraj Singh Saini, and the Head Girl, Taarini Ravjit, who presented the academic report. The Deputy Head Boy, Arjun Ram Singh Dhaliwal, and the Deputy Head Girl, Priya Ahluwalia, presented the Boarding House and Social Service reports. Bikramjeet Suri and Jasmine Narang, Co-Curricular Captains, narrated the co-curricular achievements of the school. Amandeep Singh Sobti and Simrata Grewal, Sports Captains, gave a vivid account of sports in YPS.

The prize distribution ceremony followed, with prizes being awarded for academics and co-curricular activities as well as sports colours. House trophies were also presented, with Patiala House winning the Cock House Trophy.

The Chief Guest on the occasion was Mr Abhinav Bindra, India's first Olympic gold medallist in individual sport. In his address to the gathering he said, "I believe three things, if followed



systematically, will lead to victory: passion, hard work and belief in yourself." But the most important thing, he said, was learning to lose. "When you lose, you can always identify what problems you need to fix, and come back with renewed vigour."

A variety entertainment programme was presented by the students. The children in the Hindustani orchestra rendered Sarasvati Vandana, accompanied by musical instruments ranging from the harmonium to xylophone. A western music orchestra too delighted the audience. The Junior School students presented a muchapplauded mime show. The final act was a play based on Vikram Seth's 'The Elephant and the Tragopan'.

The performances and presentations were greatly appreciated by the audience who were delighted to have been witness to the huge talent that YPS has to offer.







EXHIBITIONS ON THE FOUNDERS DAY

On Founders' Day, a tradition was revived and the corridors and classrooms of the school came alive with a kaleidoscope of colourful exhibits on the theme of 'Water - The Need of Today's World'. Each department had put up its own projects.

The English Department narrated a collection of poems on the beauty of water, ranging from works by Romantics such as Tennyson to modern poets like Vikram Seth. The students themselves recited the poems with very realistic emotions.

The Hindi Department laid great emphasis on the holiest of rivers, the Ganga. They not only lamented the loss of its sanctity but also displayed many models showing the river's polluted state.

The Punjabi Department explained the importance of the "punj aab" or the five rivers of Punjab and conveyed the importance of keeping them clean and pollution-free through a plethora of charts and models.

The Fine Arts Department showcased a roomful or paintings and photographs taken by the budding artists of YPS. The showpiece was a spectacular modern art piece that represented the suffering of many for a single drop of water.

The Mathematics Department had the children make innovative working models and demonstrations that showed how essential maths is to daily life and how to simplify your life using maths.



The Hobbies Department showcased the work done by teachers and students of various hobbies. The room was packed with parents and visitors lined up to check out the handicrafts, paintings, ceramics and even baked cakes on offer.

The History Department, through beautiful displays showed the significance of rivers as the cradles of civilization. The Harrapan Civilization and The Mesopotamian Civilization were charmingly shown.

The Geography Department had a wonderful model of the upcoming Dam on the river Ravi. They also had various charts explaining the course of a river, and the waterworks departments among others.

The students of the Learning Centre had made a lovely presentation of water conservation. They also made drawings and paintings related to the theme.

The Biology Department made a small-scale representation on Biomagnification. An aquarium about Marine Animals and a handmade microscope were the other attractions.



The Chemistry Department depicted the pollution caused by chemical industries and suggested remedial measures. They even showed the workings of a Waterworks Plant.

The Physics Department pulled crowds as their displays demonstrated hands-on fun with physics, from the working of a dam to propeller-boats and hydraulic lifts.

The Commerce students presented a water audit revealing how much water (as well as money) can be saved simply by keeping a check on small problems like tiny leaks here and there. The eyecatching display of taps and banners was well received.

The Psychology Department focussed on the negative side of water, showing how phobias developed and how they could be treated with a desensitization process.

The Trekking Exhibition attracted a lot of attention with children presenting a live demonstration of roughing it out in the wild, from camping to river-crossing. Visitors were enthralled by the makeshift cooking equipment that produced such delicious food.

A New-Look YPS!

Over the past few months, YPS has experienced a series of changes, from getting a new Principal to some unique infrastructural alterations.

The building of the Junior Wing has been extended to accommodate a Dance Room and a Theatre Room, much to the joy of the students. This will provide wider scope for the development of these finer skills among students.

The Senior School Building has also had many transformations. There is an extension in the front part of the building (facing the dining hall) with a porch at the office entrance. With shuffling of classrooms and laboratories, our

school has taken a revolutionary step in making greater use of technology. Tata Class EDGE was a new system that has been installed in every classroom of the Senior School from classes VI to X and in every science laboratory. It has also been introduced in at least three rooms of the Junior Wing. This step has helped us move forward from the blackboard mode of teaching to a smarter system. It evoked a good response from students as well as teachers.

The Vice Principal's office has been moved into a newly built room. With the setting up of a new and more accessible staff computer laboratory, its benefits are being enjoyed by all staff members. To add to the fun, our entire school campus has become Wi-Fi enabled.

A much needed initiative has been taken to put the whole school under electronic surveillance by installing CCTV cameras all over the premises. This has helped in improving the discipline by keeping a check on the students as well as staff.

The Senior School Library has become more spacious. The Art Room has been shifted into a bigger hall near the Kindergarten area, while the Music Room too now has greater room for the sound to reverberate.

Indeed, YPS has experienced a transition worth being proud of. We hope such positive changes continue and change not only YPS but Yadavindrians too! We look forward to seeing a new, better and worthier YPS!

A Day Out to Watch 'Bhaag Milkha Bhaag'




