## **ACADEMIC REPORT**

At Junior School, we create a happy, lively and stimulating place of learning where children are able to achieve their full potential in a safe and secure environment. In order to do this we use interactive methods like the Interactive Board, E-Blocks and Discovery Room that sow seeds of learning and enquiry.

The school subscribed to the National Geographic magazine which was also used in the teaching of English, Science, Social Studies and Computer projects.

Literary activities are an integral part of the curriculum. Spelling Bee in English and Poetry Recitation in English, Hindi, and Punjabi were conducted for all classes. English and Punjabi Calligraphy were also organized for all classes. Drop Everything and Read (DEAR), a fifteen minute time slot devoted to reading entered its third year. It has become a pleasurable habit with the children and now they don't need to be asked to open their books to read.

To further hone the reading skills and vocabulary of students, Buddy Reading was introduced in which the students of Class IV mentored children of Class II under the supervision of teachers. It was very well received by the students.

This year the Social Studies and Science Annual Project Display was based on the topic 'Types of Pollution' in which students created models to show Land,

Air, Water and Noise Pollution.
They also drove home the message about preventing pollution through a foot tapping Punjabi Song 'Uthove lokon, jagove lokon' and a skit on 'Solutions to Pollution'.

#### **ENGLISH**

In 2014, the focus was on helping children gain confidence in speaking fluent English and on making learning effective and interesting. To achieve this, engaging activities such as Scrabble, Spin-a-Yarn, Just-a-Minute and Spelling Bee were conducted. Children learnt how to communicate their ideas and thoughts using language correctly through creative writing exercises.

#### **MATHEMATICS**

Mathematics is more interesting when it is application based. To achieve this, various teaching aids like Jodo Gyan and Interactive Board were used.

Tangrams, Patterns and Data Handling activities provided an additional perspective to the number system, while systematic exercises in Mental Math enhanced speed, accuracy and logical thinking skills.

#### **SCIENCE**

The Discovery Room encouraged the development of an inquisitive mind and a scientific temper. The students performed different experiments and also witnessed many experiment set-ups to understand the Science behind daily life. Their excitement towards science was visible when they brought live specimens of things they saw around, like a caterpillar, larvae, a stick insect or butterfly eggs. They enthusiastically shared their findings with all in the Science Room.

#### **SOCIAL STUDIES**

To help the children comprehend concepts, individual and group

research work was encouraged to facilitate learning beyond textbook content. Regular visits to 'Discovery Room' and the use of the Interactive Board made the learning process more collaborative and meaningful.

#### **HINDI**

Innovative use of visual aids, storytelling, poetry and the Interactive Board made learning Hindi fun. This helped the children connect better with the language.

#### **PUNJABI**

Our endeavor is to enhance language skills in Punjabi and make students aware of the rich literary heritage of Punjab. To achieve this, Punjabi periodicals and books on Punjabi literature were added to the library. Audio Visual Aids, Creative Writing, Calligraphy and Poetry Recitation Competition formed an intrinsic part of Punjabi Curriculum to keep the children interested and

enthusiastic towards the language.

#### **COMPUTER**

To help our children keep pace with technology, computer basics and software were taught using an application based approach. Audio Visual aids were extensively used. Classes I and II learnt the fundamentals of computer and using the keyboard and mouse in MS Paint and Word Pad. Class III worked on MS Word and LOGO. Class IV and V learnt MS PowerPoint. All children made presentations related to their academic subjects using the software learnt. Using the skills learnt, our children made us proud by securing noteworthy positions at the Class. School and State level in the International Informatics Olympiad in ICO 2013-14.

#### **WESTERN MUSIC**

Considering the huge amount of talent on the rolls, it comes as

no surprise that music plays a vital part of the daily routine for the students at Junior School. The Assembly is incomplete without the melodious songs sung by the Choir. Through the year, children develop their skill through proper training and vocal exercises. As a part of this year's Annual Plan, the Thematic assemblies for Classes I, II and III saw the students sing to promote awareness about 'Saving Planet Earth', ' Birds' and 'Sea Creatures.' The Western Music Choir presented the song 'World's Greatest' on the occasion of Founder's Day. The song 'All in All' was presented to celebrate Good Friday and Easter Sunday. The year ended with wonderful Christmas carols and yuletides being sung to mark the celebration of Christmas.

#### **INDIAN MUSIC**

We believe that music is the strongest form of magic. Music teaches the children a sense and

power of rhythm. The children learnt 'Sargam' and 'Raagas' along with numerous melodies. During morning assemblies, thematic assemblies and other festive occasions, the children presented melodious songs. On Republic Day and Independence Day, the Indian Music Choir sang patriotic songs like 'Laksh Na Ojhal Hone Paye' and 'Gulonke Rang Se' to acclaim from the whole school. Class I and II sang a Punjabi song in their Thematic Assembly, whereas Class IV and V enthused the audience by singing 'Ashayein' on the eve of the Founder's Day.

#### **THEATRE**

At YPS, theatre is not just improvisation or performing skits; it is about encouraging children to express themselves without any inhibitions. To achieve this, sessions included value-based storytelling and performances. The session based on 'Ego', where they learnt to identify "ego" and manage it, was well received by the students. Performing in the theatre class gave the children immense joy and improved their self esteem. Our Annual Play 'Holka Polka' received rave reviews.

#### **DANCE**

Dance was introduced with the teaching of Kathak to develop flexibility and a sense of rhythm. The children exhibited their skills on occasions like Holi, Independence Day, Shivaratri and Janamasthmi. The Thematic Assemblies of Classes I, II and III, Dance Hobby for Class IV and V, and The Annual Play for Class V also showcased the students putting their best foot forward.

#### THE LIBRARY

The Library at Junior School is an exciting venue for reading, listening to stories and literary activities that support and follow up reading. These activities ranged from 'Buddy- Reading' sessions (where Grade IV became reading mentors for Grade II), to writing 'Acrostic Poems' and book reviews. A video demonstrating Book Binding helped Grade IV and V learn the art of binding, and care for books. Grade Land II children made illustrations based on storytelling sessions, while Grade III children enthusiastically













took part in the Homophone Tree that made them recognize and practise homophones. This year we added encyclopedias, books on fiction as well as Teacher's reference books to our collection, which now stands at 8455 books.

#### **ART AND CRAFT**

The year 2014 was exciting and involved many new activities such as making kites, airplanes, parachutes, figurines of Plaster of Paris, baskets, that improved the children's artistic as well as motor skills.

Making masks, head gears,

banners for projects such as Special Assemblies and festivals, gave the children an opportunity to develop teamwork skills and boost their confidence. Our young artists also loved learning new techniques of painting such as marble painting, spray-painting, thumbpainting and also papier-mâché, flower-making, embroidery, puppets and mobiles.

#### SPECIAL ASSEMBLIES

To give the tiny tots of Classes I, II and III an opportunity to explore and showcase their talents, thematic assemblies were staged for parents throughout the year. Class I of 2014 put up a thematic assembly based on the theme 'Save Planet Earth.' Class II presented 'Bird's Eye View' and Class III brought the sea life alive on the Junior School stage through their performance on the theme 'The Aquatic World.' The performance of the children delighted the parents and grandparents.



YPS is committed to the development of all-round excellence within its student body, a fact clearly demonstrated throughout 2014 with the school enjoying significant success academically, in the co-curricular area of life and in sports.

2014 saw the School enjoying a fine set of ISC results with our students coming out on top in every stream. This result means that YPS, despite being a nonselective school, has outperformed all other schools in Chandigarh, Mohali and Panchkula. Siddhartha Yaddanapudi topped the Science stream with 95.75%. He was the highest ranking student in the tricity. Simrata Kaur Grewal topped the Commerce stream with 93.75% and Priya Kaur Ahluwalia topped the Humanities stream with 91.25%. A total of 48 students appeared

for the ISC examination in the year 2014, of which 93.75% scored 60% and above, with 7 students scoring above 90%.

The ICSE result was no less impressive with Avantika Gargya of Class X achieving the top rank with 96.2%. She was closely followed by Komal Singh with a score of 95.4% and Avinash Singh with 94.8%. A total of 120 students appeared for the ICSE examination with a huge 95.8% scoring 60% and above. Of these 20 students scored above 90% while 40 students scored between 80% and 90%.

#### **ENVIRONMENT REPORT**

Mother Earth is on the warpath. We regularly face her wrath as we continue to abuse her resources. The need of the hour is environmental conservation and this awareness is inculcated into the minds of the Yadavindrians through activities like water and electricity conservation, paper-recycling, planting trees, usage of ecofriendly products, and taking care of wildlife in and around

the areas we live in.

Students at YPS are motivated to Reduce, Reuse, Recycle and Rethink. The consumption of water and electricity in school and at home is monitored through reduction in bills. Children are encouraged to use eco-friendly items like cloth bags, cloth napkins, make notebooks from unused pages, to use products of recycled paper, buy gifts without packaging and from companies

which take back used products and recycle them. Students across all grades participated in drawing and slogan-writing competitions, and cycle rallies promoting the theme- "Save the Planet Earth". Videos related to various environmental issues were shown and brain storming sessions held.

Class VI students marched towards environmental conservation by going for morning and evening walks



where they observed local environmental problems like parking menace, garbage disposal, polluted water bodies, and noise pollution. They tried to come up with sustainable solutions for the same. The issue of water crisis was taken up by the students of Class VII. They were shown videos on the water supply in the Tricity, its sources and causes of water shortage. They collected water bills and made an effort to reduce the amount through water auditing and rain water harvesting.

Conservation of electricity, petrol, diesel and LPG was taken up by Class VIII. They discussed ways to reduce the use of non-renewable sources of energy at home and at school. Electricity auditing was done and ideas on how carpool, cycling, walking and optimum use of LPG can be inducted into day-to-day life were discussed. Yadavindrians declared themselves green warriors by celebrating Green Diwali and Waterless Holi. They are active members of project SEARCH and STEP programmes launched by

YPS began the year by greeting students with a spruced up campus. A fresh coat of distemper on all the buildings gave the campus a new and colourful look. Several changes were effected inside too. A new conference hall with facilities for audio visual presentation was set up. The school upgraded its computer labs and audio-visual classrooms with N-Computing technology. Around 35 new systems were added. This year the Kindergarten too was equipped with audio-visual classrooms and a Teachers' Computer lab.

A new staffroom, with ten workstations on the second floor of the Senior School added to the delight and comfort of the teachers.

Adding a further bounce to our young players' game, synthetic turf has been laid on one tennis

court – the second one will also get it this year. Following an energy audit YPS has gone green with a vengeance. Several high wattage lights have been replaced with CFL's and LED lights.

The beautiful look has been supplemented with a 'stay healthy' motto. As a result of this all the water coolers have been fitted with filters. The drinking water plant has undergone a complete overhaul and has a 7 stage water purification system with chlorination and UV technology.

Our lovely cricket grounds got its crowning glory with the inauguration of the Amar Singh Memorial Cricket Pavilion. The happy note continued after the summer vacations when students returned to a newly renovated Dining Hall with enhanced seating capacity (about 100) and an airy, well-lit interior with new furniture. The

addition of two separate areas for washing hands abutting it encourages hygiene. The Dining area also now boasts of a larger, child-friendly milk distribution point.

A school is only as good as its students and staff, but to do well they need to be supported by wise and sound investment in creating infrastructure that nurtures yet stimulates. YPS is constantly in a growth phase as new ideas are explored and changes made to the buildings, grounds.

The next year will see the completion of an exciting Russian Obstacle Course which will run parallel to the boundary wall. To nurture minds a new Mathematic Laboratory will become operational next year. This lab which has some exciting hardware will make teaching / learning mathematics great fun.

#### **LEARNING CENTRE**

The teaching profession has its own set of challenges. At YPS we constantly make an attempt to search deep into the problems of the students who struggle with learning. The Learning Centre at YPS caters to the needs of students with knowledge gaps, skillgaps, learning difficulties and behavioral disorders. In order to address such needs of children, YPS has the unique facility to address the special needs of the children. The Centre has students both from the junior and the senior wing.

At YPS the needs of slow learners and children with attention gaps is identified. A need-based assessment is done at the time of enrolling the students. Special Educators, using appropriate techniques and tools work with each student according to the specific need. Issues related to Reading, comprehension, written

expression, sequencing, low attention span, retention and numerical concepts are addressed.

Students show marked improvement through collaborative effort of class teachers, special educators and parents. Such a collective effort shows not just an improvement in the student's academic results, but also in their evolvement as adults.

During the academic year 2014a 2 day workshop was conducted in the junior school for the teachers to identify the children with special needs so that remedial measures are taken as early as possible.

## NIOS - NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF OPEN SCHOOLING

The school prepares students o to take the exams of the NIOS. The students who opt for the Open School Board for the Secondary and Senior Secondary Levels can have the option of being taught selective subjects according to their choice.

They can make a choice from the subjects available. Guidance is provided to the children for their specific choices for NIOS course work as well as their assignments.

A total of ten students will appear through the NIOS -both for the secondary and senior secondary levels in the year 2014 -2015. The performance of the students last year was creditable with all students clearing their exams. Two of the students who cleared class 10th through the NIOS have successfully sought admission in various diploma courses.

The emphasis is on overall development of the children so that they can participate and excel in all other activities, which include sports, art, and photography. The students from the Open school have won

laurels in various sports events as swimming, football, athletics and horse riding.

Overall the Open school offers the children an opportunity of completing their formal education of secondary and senior secondary levels along with the option of participating in all school and inter school activities and events. This is exclusively an option for the students at YPS those who do not wish to do the ICSE.

#### COUNSELLING CELL REPORT

The School counselling cell focused on the relations and

interactions between students and their school environment. The aim is to reduce the effects of environmental and institutional barriers that impede academic and socio-emotional success. To achieve this, the Counselling Cell collaborated with all teaching departments for the identification of students struggling with academic and non-academic activities. This was followed by detailed interaction with the child, parent and teacher concerned. Extensive psycho-educational assessments were made using the screening tools like Perceived Stress Scale by Sheldon Cohen, CRAFFT Screening Questionnaire. Paediatric Symptom Checklist (PPSC) and Problem Oriented Screening Instruments for Teenagers (POSIT) developed by the National Institute of Drug Abuse were used to diagnose the underlying problems like social adjustment, sibling rivalry, parental discord, hysterical and

anxiety disorders.

Both Individual and group sessions were offered to students during the course of counselling to enhance their adaptive and social skills to deal with the day to day difficulties of life. Special emphasis was given to life-skills education that allowed them to effectively deal with different situations like conflict resolution, relationship management, sexual health, stress and managing peer pressure. Various techniques like role play, debate, discussions, psychodramas, and situation analysis were used to help them understand and manage adolescence anxiety and balancing inner-outer world conflicts. The School counsellor worked proactively and responsively within the principles of a Promotion, Prevention and Early Intervention framework.

Prior to the examinations, workshops on effective study

skills, note making skills, exams writing skills and memory enhancement strategies were also undertaken for the benefit of students. To give comprehensive knowledge on different streams and upcoming careers was conducted for the students of class 10. To assist them in taking Right Career decisions, we developed a Career **Decision Scanning Programme** (CDSP) on the basis of psychometric tests like Myers Brigg type Inventory (MBTI), Differential Aptitude Test (DAT), Vocational Interest Record and Cattell Culture Fair Intelligence test. This scientific profile was then matched with the required skills needed for an occupation and an appropriate career path was suggested.

#### MUSIC REPORT

The one day when students do not have to be coaxed to move to the school auditorium and need no reminders to "stop Melodious Moments



talking' is the day of the 'Inter-House Music Competition'.
Rabindra Nath Tagore said "music fills the infinite between two souls", and at YPS, we can see this come alive. The whole senior school troops in at the appointed hour and is held spellbound by the magic in the students' voices and enthralled by the music played by different House bands.

YPS enjoyed this magical afternoon on October 17, 2014, when the Inter-House Music Competition was organized.

There were 3 rounds – House Band; solo singing; folk song. In the first round 16 students played a composition on different instruments like sitar (2) harmonium (2), synthesizer (4), Plate-tarang (1), Tabla (2), Guitar (2), Drums (1), Markas (1) and khanjari (1).

The second round was solo singing where one student from each House sang a song. The third round was a group folk song where a group of twelve students from each house performed a folk song. For the first time since its inception, there was a tie for the first place between Nalagarh House and Ranjit House. The third place went to Tagore House. Aitchison House and Patiala House made up the 4th and 5th place.

1st: Jaisveen Kaur (Ranjit House) 2nd: Kashish Khandpura (Nalagarh House) 3rd: Sukhan Rangi (Tagore House)

Puneet Kaur (Patiala House) was awarded a special mention.

However, it is not the only day that we have students holding us captive with their singing abilities. The musical journey this year began with the Republic Day. 68 students took part and sang 'Yeh hamara watan' and 'dil diya hai jaan bhi denge'. 'Vande Matram' sung by Jaisveen Kaur was appreciated by all.

On Holi, a classical song, 'Aaj khelo shyam sang holi' was beautifully sung in 'Teentaal'.
Basant Panchami was celebrated with 'Lo phir basant aayi'.

A song, 'Eid Mumbarak' sung during morning assembly brought the festival alive for the school.

April 22, Earth Day, saw a special assembly where 'Yeh hai dharti hamaari' accompanied by instrumental music by the

students showed our appreciation for our beautiful earth.

The Founder's Day is a day of pride for the school and the choir added to the solemnity of the occasion by rendering a Shabad to begin the day's proceedings. They also sang a lively patriotic song "Ekta Swatantrata Samanta Rahe".

Independence Day celebrations can never be complete without the beautiful voices of the choir. 'Pyara desh hamaara hai' added to the patriotic fervour. The costumes of white kurtas with tricolor sashes and flags made the occasion even more memorable.

To celebrate the birth of Shri Krishna the choir sang two beautiful bhajans - "badi der bhai nand lala" and 'gobind bolo hari gopal bolo". Part time teachers were appointed to teach these students.

#### IAYP REPORT - SOCIAL SERVICE

The International Award for Young People is an exciting, self-development programme available to all young people worldwide, equipping them with life skills to make a difference to themselves, their communities and the world. The IAYP is not a competitive award. It aims to develop people of substance. The students need to simply practice all the modules of the programme in a consistent way to complete the award.

A workshop was held by Mr. Atul Bhalla (National Director) who apprised the students of the need and utility of the IAYP programme. Also, two workshops were organized in







the school by Mr. Ajay Singh, Mrs. Seema Dhawan and Mr. Karamjit, which emphasized the process and the benefits of the award. Each child was given a 'Record Book' and a 'Diary' in which to record all their work.

To date over 65 young people from our school have been motivated to undertake a variety of voluntary and challenging activities like:

Adventure Section: A trek in Manali, Himachal Pradesh which covered all the aspects of trekking; survival techniques and helped foster love and care for Nature.

**Service Section**: Service to the old age people in old age home and blind children in the blind school, service to the community by maintaining the school herbal gardens, landscaping, creating awareness among the students and community to save paper, waste paper management, paper recycling and bird care. The service module ensures that the participants develop empathy for the other communities of the society and emerge as leaders with a resourceful and rational thinking.

#### **Physical Recreation Section:**

Participation in various physical recreational activities in the school as a compulsory module for fitness making them fit to serve society.

**Skill Section**: The awardees worked on their chosen skills and were able to nurture their passion.

In addition to developing individual skills, SUPW aims to help develop among the students the habit to work as a community, encourage community thinking, increase awareness of scientific advancements and develop a scientific outlook. The training acquired in the classroom is expected to help students to solve day-to-day problems of the community.



#### **HOLA INDIA!**

Coming to India as a Spanish

teacher has been one of the greatest challenges I have encountered so far, and it has turned out to be one of the most rewarding experiences as well. It's been, actually, a double task: not only to immerse myself into the crowded Indian waters—as if their colours, clothes, flavours, traditions and nature weren't challenging enough—but also find my way across the YPS world, which is another culture itself.

Learning the school's timetables, rules and daily routines and truly understanding the rhythms, personalities and moods of not only my students, but also of the other teachers and staff members, has been an important part of my daily duties. However, I have received lots of help on the way—from the very first day on, I have felt the interest and care of all of the students, and there's always been someone there to guide me whenever I was lost, both

figuratively and literally (I have been walking around without finding my classrooms more times than I would like to admit).

Undoubtedly, the most gratifying part of my experience in YPS has been the opportunity of sharing my own language and culture with the students and the staff members. To receive countless "buenos días", "buenas tardes" and "¿cómo estás?" a day (even from students who I don't directly teach), and to notice that -well, almost- no one thinks that I am from Spain anymore, are only tiny details among dozens of others that make me feel valued. appreciated and at home every day.

I would like to express my gratitude towards everyone in this school who made possible my stay here in the first place, and all those who have eased my experience with their advices, patience, help and their daily smiles. I am confident that in the months to come I will continue to understand and enjoy the Indian culture and language (or should I say languages?) and that my year in YPS will definitely be an unforgettable time in my life.

I did not know how to study because the syllabus was not only from the books provided by school but also from various other books which we kids did not know about. I had been thrown into a world of stress. Thankfully, my dad realized that the education system in Korea did not suit me and decided to send me back to India.

So that's how I got back to India. I'm back in YPS with my friends.

Sometimes I see Korea as a foreign country rather than home. I'm comfortable with the surroundings here in India. When everthings are hard for me I always have my friends and my family besides me. I'm happier than ever. I can speak English and Hindi, which makes my life here in India way easier. There might be few more to come, but YPS has now prepared me!
